### **Submission Requirements**

**Transformance:** The AEDP Journal publishes articles centered on annotated session transcripts or case studies that illuminate key aspects of AEDP theory or methodology. Submissions may be primarily clinical or theoretical in focus but should foreground AEDP principles and references. We also appreciate book and movie reviews that align with the Spirit of AEDP.

## Format Requirements

Articles for Transformance: The AEDP Journal must include the following sections:

- **Abstract** (150–250 words)
- **Introduction**: Provide a narrative overview that outlines the central argument or focus of the article.
- **Body**: Organize the development of your main points using clear section headings and subheadings.
- **Literature Support**: Incorporate relevant literature to support your argument, with a priority on AEDP sources.
- Case Study Requirement: Articles based on clinical material must include an annotated session transcript.
- Annotated Transcript Formatting:
  - o Use abbreviations: *Th*: (Therapist), *Pt*: (Patient) or *Ct*: (Client).
  - o Format interventions in **bold** within [brackets].
  - Use *italics* for nonverbal responses from therapist and patient, placed within (parentheses).
- Conclusion: Summarize key insights and implications.
- **References**: Include a complete reference list formatted according to APA guidelines.

### **Technical Requirements**

- **File Format**: Submit manuscripts in Microsoft Word. **Do not** use software that converts Pages to Word the complex formatting required for an article does not lend itself to correct conversion.
- Length: Manuscripts should not exceed 15,000 words, including references.
- Font: Use Times New Roman, 12-point size.
- Spacing: Use 1.5 line spacing throughout.
- **Paragraph Format**: Do not indent paragraphs (The tab function doesn't always agree with editing tools). Use a double space to indicate a new paragraph.
- **In-Text Citations**: Follow APA guidelines for all in-text citations.
- **References**: Format the reference list according to APA guidelines.

# The editing process: What to expect

As your editor, I strive to bring your ideas into sharper focus for the reader while honoring the voice and integrity of your work. My first read-through is dedicated to understanding your thesis and the unfolding of your argument. I take seriously the importance of preserving your unique style, especially when extensive editing for clarity is needed.

I use Microsoft Word's editing tools to track all the changes I make to the text. I'll correct awkward sentences and handle minor edits, and I may suggest headings and subheadings to support the structure. I may add transitional sentences or rearrange a sentence placement to better serve the flow of the paragraph.

When an edit involves meaning—whether a sentence or an entire section—I'll highlight it and use comments to ask clarifying questions. In this way, the editing process is highly collaborative. I tend to include many comments that can be read alongside the text. While it may seem like a lot at first glance, most writers find it makes sense as they work through it.

If you prefer, we can also walk through the article and comments together on a Zoom call—often the most efficient and productive approach.
